Dear Senator Tower:

Enclosed is my check for \$2,000 for two tickets to the Senate-House Majority Dinner.

This may be my last check to the Republican Party (I may be broke unless present economic policies of the President as to tight money and sky-high interest rates aren't changed), after having donated well over \$100,000 in the past few years -- which I am sure Barry Goldwater and Paul Fannin, as well as many other Republicans, can attest to, concerning a great part of this.

I now find myself completely disillusioned and am fearful that President Nixon may go down in history as the first Chief of State in the world who wrecked the economics of a country by design rather than by accident. He is apparently listening to the same brand of economists whom the Democrats have been listening to for the past forty years. There never has been, nor ever will be, a time when raising the interest rates and union-power wage rates and taxes will reduce the cost of doing business or the selling price of products and services.

All of these things can destroy the economy of the country and put millions of people out of work; but increased costs can never reduce the selling price, and price rises, which are inflation, will go merrily on up, up and up.

I am still hoping that someone will get the message to Mr. Nixon before it is too late.

I heartily agree with President Nixon's aims in slowing inflation, but not the method used, I heartily agree with all of the President's other policies and I am proud that we have a Republican President; but I can't stand by silently without expressing my concern that he is very near to so severely damaging the economy of this country and completely destroying himself and any chance of another Republican president's being elected for a long time.

The Canons of Professional Ethics of the American Bar Association and the Rules of Professional Conduct of the State Bar of California make it clear that it is not only improper but unprofessional for an attorney to discuss client matters or otherwise publicize his practice.

Given these circumstances, I'm certain that as a responsible writer you understand our inability to grant you the requested interview.

Two things justify my exposing these reactions to you.

First: Unless President Nixon has a firm commitment from John Connolly that he will not break ranks to accept a presidential nomination from the Democratic Party, it would not surprise me at all if the Democratic Party found him the most attractive and able candidate possible. He has come through so loud and strong in his support of Phase I and Phase II. I can see this as a real possibility. Even greater than the possibility of his being the President's running mate instead of Vice President Agnew. Think about it.

Second: When President Nixon proposed the Revenue Sharing Program, with the states, I was horrified. I think it is immoral, uneconomical and consider it as nothing but politic. I am unalterably opposed to it.

Now it seems the President is proposing another bit of legislation that is even more startling. I refer to tax funds to be set aside to finance political campaigns under certain rules, regulations and restrictions. If it is within the power of the President to veto this legislation, but he lets it become law, definitely, I will not support his campaign. The very

thought is un-American and I think it plays right into the hands of the Democrats and especially the unions. These are harsh words, but I feel very strongly about it.

John Connolly made it very plain in his press comments the other day, defending and supporting Phase II, when in answer to a question about the Democratic Party deficit, he made it very clear it was his judgment that if the Democratic Party, or, any party for that matter, had a competent, attractive candidate they would have no trouble getting the money. I believe this completely and we don't need tax dollars. The unions are already spending enough tax dollars in their own sweet way.

I too enjoyed our visit and, particularly, to know you. Let's keep in touch and see what happens, but I did want to put myself on record on these points.

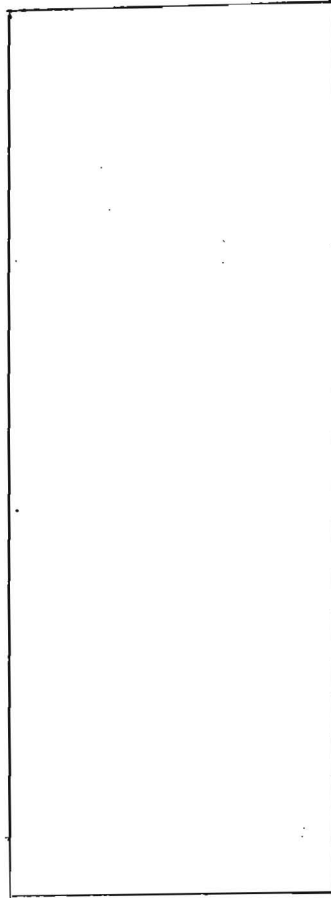
