ADDITIONAL INFORMATION  
CONCERNING POLITICAL TRENDS IN HAWAII

This supplements an earlier memo (copy attached). It reflects the findings of a private poll conducted for Fred Rohlfing by Corey, Canapary & Galanis in December 1971 among 389 selected residents of the First Congressional District in Hawaii which is currently represented by Spark Matsunaga. The district is comprised of the most densely populated areas of metropolitan Honolulu, including the downtown area, Waikiki and many of the suburban environs. Registration in the district is 41% Democrat, 13% Republican and 46% Independent. The 1968 presidential election returns for the district were as follows: Humphrey 59%, Nixon 40% and Wallace 1%.

The poll shows that only 38% of the people feel the President is doing a good or excellent job (56% think he is doing a fair or poor job and 6% don't know) and only 34% would like to see him returned to office next year while 41% would like to see someone else. (25% either "don't know," or say "it depends.") In two-man matchups, however, the President is favored over every Democrat except Kennedy. Again, though, the uncommitted total (i. e., persons saying they would vote for neither or answering "don't know") is at least 25% in each matchup except Nixon-Kennedy where it is 20%.

Economic issues predominated in response to questions about the most important issues in next year's Congressional election. 45% identified the cost of living as an important issue and 41% identified jobs or unemployment. (It is probably significant that the poll was taken before the dock strike was resumed in mid-January 1972. Current interest in economic issues is probably even higher because of the strike.) Two issues tied for third place -- the Vietnam war and racial discrimination -- with 37% of the people feeling they were the most important issues.

Finally, 52% of the people disagreed with the proposition that the government should not intrude into the economy with such things as price and wage freezes. 19% agreed strongly and another 19% agreed somewhat.

The poll tends to confirm observations that the President is in difficulty in Hawaii, but it also indicates that he is doing **better** there now than he did in 1968 and, assuming reasonable success in the Economic Stabilization Program and related economic policies, he probably stands to make further gains in view of public preoccupation with economic issues. The dock strike is a related issue on which he (and the Administration) can take the initiative and which responds to perceived public concerns (e. g. , .cost of living, jobs, etc.)

INTRODUCTION

This report presents the statistical results of a public opinion study conducted among registered voters (and persons who plan to register prior to this years elections) in the First Congressional District (Oahu). The map on the adjoining page shows the boundaries of the District. The 5th, 6th, and 7th State Senatorial Districts are completely within the boundaries of the Congressional District. Only a portion of the 4th State Senatorial District, however, falls within its boundaries.

In total, 389 interviews were conducted. Twenty interviewers worked on the project during the period December 11, 1971 - January 11, 1972. All respondents were interviewed at their homes by means of the personal face-to-face interviewing method. Current registration data were used in allocating the sample. Specific quotas by State Senatorial Districts and State Representative Districts were specified. Interviewers were assigned specific starting "blocks" or "block equivalents" and instructed to conduct no more than ten interviews from a given starting point. At least half of the interviewing was conducted on the weekend and during evening hours to assure adequate representation within the sample of working women; men and children not usually available during the daytime hours on weekdays. The only assigned quotas were by senatorial and geographic area. All other demographic data are "as found" in the sample.

NOTE: This is our first experience in conducting research of a political nature in the Islands. We have over the years, however, conducted many studies on Oahu. Most of these have been concerned with consumer products. For the most part we have found the respondents cooperative and more than willing to participate. In this study, however, we had an inordinate number of "refusals" by persons who did not wish to discuss their political feelings. This high refusal rate does not appear to be limited to any one geographic area or ethnic group. The sample itself produced too many Democrats and Republicans and far too few "Independents." As a rule, on Mainland studies, registration (which is not controlled by means of specific quota assignments) falls within one or two percentage points of the actual (when similar sampling and respondent selection procedures are employed). Lacking intelligence to make us think otherwise, we chose to assume that the persons who are registered as "Independents" are more reluctant to discuss politics with an interviewer than are the registered Democrats and Republicans. Based on this assumption, we have applied statistical weights to bring the registration split back into its proper proportions. Results presented here have been weighted by use of the following methods:
